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Funerals for an Infant or Child

This brochure aims to assist and offer support for families planning a child's funeral.

Funerals for Infants and Children:

We hope that the information contained in this brochure will assist by answering many of the questions we are asked when making funeral arrangements for an infant or child.

SHOULD THERE BE A FUNERAL SERVICE?

Funerals and Memorial Services are rituals which allow us to gather together to recognise and honour a life, and to offer support to those who are now bereaved.

Some parents see the loss of an infant as a deeply personal and intimate time; they request that a funeral or viewing include only themselves and possibly immediate family.

Some elect not to have a service, they request a non-attended burial or cremation and plan their own remembrances when the time is right.

Other parents choose to hold a more public service which includes wider family members, friends and colleagues.

No option is "right" or "wrong". The "right" option is the one that feels right and meets the family's individual needs and beliefs.

WHERE CAN A SERVICE BE HELD?

Families are welcome to use any of Tobin Brothers' 22 Chapels across Melbourne or in Echuca. Our facilities include smaller rooms which can be used when a more intimate service is planned. A Service may also be held in the family home, at the Graveside, Crematorium Chapel, Church, or other venues of significance to the family.

WHO WILL LEAD A SERVICE?

- Families who have a religious faith will often invite their Clergy or Priest to lead the service.
- Some families choose to have us engage an empathetic and professional Civil Celebrant.
- Some families prefer not to designate a person to lead the service. They gather and share silence, music, readings and poetry that hold special meaning for them.

WHAT OTHER DECISIONS NEED TO BE MADE TO PLAN AN INFANT OR CHILD'S FUNERAL?

An important decision is the choice between burial and cremation:

Burial

- Many Cemeteries have a "Children's Area". This
 is a special area of the Cemetery, where graves
 are often adorned with mementos, balloons,
 pinwheels and flowers.
- A family may already own a grave and find it comforting to inter the infant with another relative.
- Some parents choose to purchase a new adult grave with the thought that one day they will be able to be interred with their child.

Cremation

Cremation discussions should include considerations for the Cremated Remains. Some suggestions are:

- Placing the Cremated Remains in a specially chosen container which will be kept.
- Memorialisation at a Cemetery.
- Scattering the Cremated Remains in a significant place.
- Placing the Cremated Remains in the garden under a specially planted (potted) tree.

Clothing

Many parents provide clothing or swaddling for their child. We are able to provide a range of hand made garments, in a variety of very small sizes, at no cost, if preferred.

Viewing

Time spent viewing, cuddling or dressing the infant or child is treasured. We will do all that we can to facilitate this, either in our Chapels or at the family home. We are guided by the advice of our

professionally qualified mortuary staff, who ensure that any concerns are fully explained and discussed with the parents. Final decisions about a viewing always remain with the parents.

Keepsakes

Gathering keepsakes for a "memory box" may include hand and foot prints, pressed flowers, cards and messages of support, locks of hair, hospital name-bands, photographs and a copy of the coffin/casket engraved name plate.

Treasures

Special mementos may be placed in the coffin/casket to always remain. These may include photographs, poetry, letters, special toys or blankets - whatever is meaningful to the parents and family.

Coffin/Casket

A lacquered coffin is included in our Professional Service Fee for all children under the age of 15. A coffin is shaped, wide at the shoulder and narrow at the foot end. A casket, which is rectangular with a hinged lid, may be selected at extra cost.

Infant or Child Coffins and Caskets are usually white, pink or blue. They may be personalised by choosing different colours, adding hand written messages, hand prints, or other decorations such as stickers or decals.

Other decisions and options discussed when planning a service include:

- Floral tributes
- Newspaper notices
- Music
- Balloon, butterfly or dove release
- "Celebrated audiovisual Presentation" (photographs set to a specially chosen piece of music)
- Print items such as an Order of Service, Remembrance or Thank You Cards
- Refreshments
- Funeral Vehicles
- Donations
